

General Policies

The University regards harmonious men of all kinds in dealing with denizens or visitors, their environment or camp, and is non-discriminatory.

Animal Ethics

The University recognises its obligation under the Animal Welfare Act 1999 and recognises the humane consideration required for the care and welfare of animals in teaching and research must be a standard. There are areas of legislation which prohibit the use of animals in teaching and research methods, such as the Animal Welfare Act.

The University aims:

- (a) to promote an animal welfare ethic among staff and considerate treatment of animals in handling, no greater harm or suffering is produced than would be acceptable by community standards; and
- (b) to ensure humane treatment and research involving the use of animals is not hindered by scientific techniques or carelessness.

Application for review and approval may be made to the Animal Ethics Committee, the appropriate form.

Camping, Drunkenness and Alcohol Policy

The University of Canterbury requires to provide a safe and secure environment for all students and staff in the University camp. This policy clearly outlines the rules regarding drunkenness and alcohol use in the University camp.

Harmful Ethics

The University of Canterbury aims to promote ethical behaviour and research. The Harmful Ethics Committee ensures that researchers hold research in accordance with the principles of harm reduction, including the principle of non-maleficence, respect for autonomy, and informed consent. The principle of non-maleficence is regarded as the highest principle and is to be followed in all research activities, and in accordance with the principles of harm reduction, including the principle of non-maleficence, respect for autonomy, and informed consent.

All research involving harmful researchers, including the principle of non-maleficence, respect for autonomy, and informed consent, must be conducted in accordance with the principles of harm reduction, including the principle of non-maleficence, respect for autonomy, and informed consent.

Application for review and approval may be made to the Harmful Ethics Committee, the appropriate form.
