of Art f cial Intelligence and Autonomy, though this declarat on has been criticised for being vague (Human Rights Watch, 2023). The primary regulatory forum for LAWs is the CCW, part of the UN system. As this group works based on consensus, states opposing LAWs regulat on can effect vely veto regulation negotiations (Stop Killer Robots, 2024). Thus, the CCW is restricted by the regressive beliefs of a small group of states (Qerimi, 2023). Supporters of bans, regulations and restrictions for autonomous weapons systems are unable to make progress within this forum.

With tradit onal mult lateral fora not currently an efective avenue to regulate LAWs, alternative options for small states include acting as norm entrepreneurs and at empting to regulate LAWs externally to the CCW. Small states are labelled as weak actors in the international system due to their limited resources and hard power (Thorhallsson, 2019). However, Ingebritsen (2002) highlights the power that small states can hold in constructing global norms, defined as "established practices, codes of conduct, and standards of acceptable
